
VIENNA:

LEISURE AND CULTURE IN VIENNA

Last but not least, Vienna is also well known for its welcoming atmosphere of 'Gemütlichkeit', its famous coffee houses and Heurigen (wine taverns).





INTERNATIONAL CAMPUS

The DA is located in a former imperial palace in the centre of Vienna. All courses are taught on the premises, which also provide accommodation for a large number of students: there are 40 single en suite rooms in the campus dorm.

The spirit of the campus is characterised by its international student body with representatives from all four corners of the globe. Every year young people from more than forty different countries live and study at the DA. This very diversity ensures that 'internationalism' is not just an abstract, theoretical item on the syllabus, but something practised on a daily basis.

The demanding class schedule keeps all students on campus most of the time during the trimester and campus facilities enrich their experience at the DA by creating a community whose members share a learning environment, as well as meals (three meals/day for students who sign-up for full-board), coffee breaks and communal areas.

International newspapers and magazines, as well as a satellite TV, are available in the common room next to the library.

Maria Theresa Prince Wenzel Anton Kaunitz

Students in the 1960s

The Diplomatische Akademie Wien – Vienna School of International Studies is proud of its long history stretching back to 1754 and the days of Maria Theresa. The Oriental Academy was founded upon the recommendation of her Chancellor of State, Prince Wenzel Anton Kaunitz, a towering figure in Habsburg politics during the Enlightenment.

The Academy's special tradition of language training dates back to those times when Turkish, Arabic and Persian were taught in order to prepare young men for service in the monarchy's missions to the Ottoman Empire. But even in its early days, the Academy promoted a strong programme in economics and created the first chair of international law in Austria. At the close of the nineteenth century it was reorganised as the Imperial and Royal Consular Academy, which trained young men for the ever-growing consular and foreign service of the Austro-Hungarian Empire.

During World War II the Academy was closed down. The modern Academy was reopened in 1964 by the then foreign minister Bruno Kreisky. It was restructured in 1996 and established as an independent public institution.

Our full-time study programmes aim to equip students with the knowledge and tools necessary to better understand, assess and actively define international global developments. The academic curriculum in the four study disciplines is the cornerstone of all programmes at the DA.

Individual study programmes ensure that students can deepen their knowledge from previous studies, but also acquire a basic understanding of the disciplines they have never studied before.

The main study areas are: political science and international relations, international economics, international and European law, and contemporary history.

In addition to the academic programmes, prominent figures from the worlds of politics, business, the arts and science regularly visit the DA to present and discuss the latest developments in their fields. This emphasis on and proximity to the practical world is a key element of studying at the DA.

The DA also sets great store by the vibrant plurilingualism of its campus. Besides the formal programme of intensive language training, there are also French- or Germantaught elective courses.

The European Commission has awarded the DA with the Erasmus Charter for Higher Education (ECHE) for the whole period of the Erasmus+ Programme until 2020 (renewal in progress). The application for renewal has been submitted.

MAIS students can be admitted for the second year at the partner university where they will complete their master studies.

- MGIMO (Master Programmes in International Studies and Political Science)
- Korea University Graduate School of International Studies
- China Foreign Affairs University

RECOGNISED STUDENTS

For professionals interested in following a few selected courses of our graduate programmes, the DA offers the opportunity of registering as a recognised (non-degree) student.

Admission is on a rolling basis and contingent on the availability of places in the selected programme.

A commission decides on the admission of candidates as recognised students.

The Diploma Programme is a one-year interdisciplinary post-graduate programme offering a broad overview of the system of international relations. Particular emphasis is placed upon the relationship between theory and practice, and the promotion of plurilingualism by means of an obligatory intensive language training programme.



TARGET GROUP

The Diploma Programme addresses university graduates of all disciplines who wish to pursue an international career. Students are equipped with the necessary knowledge and skills.

THE COURSE COVERS

- Political science and international relations with special emphasis on European integration studies
- Structure and functioning of international organisations
- Economics and international economic relations
- International law and the law of the European Union
- Contemporary political history with emphasis on Central, Eastern and Southeastern Europe
- Intensive language training.

LANGUAGES OF INSTRUCTION

The language of instruction is predominantly English. Some classes are held in French and German.

LANGUAGE TRAINING

Language training in English, French and German aiming at full proficiency is compulsory. Further language training is offered in cooperation with at the Language Centre of the University of Vienna.

ADMISSION

Admission to the Diploma Progamme is by means of a competitive oral examination which can be taken either at the DA in Vienna or at an Austrian mission outside of Austria.

Candidates are admitted to the examination if they fulfil the following criteria:

- I they hold a first-level degree in any discipline from a recognized university (this includes Austrian Fachhochschule)
- I have an excellent command of English (B2)

French (elementary, A2) and German (beginner, A1) language skills are an advantage.

The entrance examination consists of an interview before a commission. All details about the exam structure and how to prepare for it are available online at www.da-vienna.ac.at/DiplomaProgramme.

DIPLOMA PROGRAMME 11

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

To receive the Diploma, a minimum of 60 ECTS points must be earned as follows:

- a) min. 40 ECTS points for core and advanced courses in all four study disciplines (international relations and politics, international and European law, international economics, history)
- b) 1 ECTS by the successful completion of a mandatory final presentation
- c) mandatory language training in English, French and German

FINAL AWARD

Diploma of the Diplomatische Akademie Wien.

For Austrians holding a bachelor's degree, the Diploma awarded by the DA is the requirement for admission to the Austrian foreign service examination (Examen A-préalabe) under current Austrian law. For up-to-date information, please consult:

The MAIS programme is designed to deal with global issues from a multidisciplinary perspective and with a particular focus on the European integration process. MAIS is a joint programme of the Vienna School of International Studies (DA) and the University of Vienna.



TARGET GROUP

The two-year programme is intended for university graduates of any nationality who are interested in further academic specialisation in international studies with a particular focus on Europe.

The goal of the MAIS programme is equipping students to understand, assess and impact on international issues.

PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

- In the first year students assimilate the principles of the four core disciplines of the programme:
 - a) political science and international relations
 - b) international economics
 - c) international and European law
 - d) history.
- The second year offers advanced courses and seminars. Students have the opportunity to deepen their knowledge in the core disciplines and to combine insights from different disciplines.
- I The programme culminates in the writing of an interdisciplinary master thesis.



The interconnectedness between nation states and the rise of private economic players and other global actors require students of international relations to pursue a multi-disciplinary approach in order to confront today's global challenges. The interdisciplinary MAIS programme, combining the fields of politics, law, history and economics, offers students a curriculum that equips them to meet these requirements.'

LANGUAGE OF INSTRUCTION

The programme is entirely taught in English. Elective courses taught in French or German are offered as well.

LANGUAGE TRAINING

French and German language courses are offered on all levels at the DA. Further language training is offered in cooperation with at the Language Centre of the University of Vienna.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Eligible for admission to the MAIS programme are candidates who fulfill the following requirements:

- a university first-level degree (bachelor's degree or equivalent) in any discipline
- I proficiency in English (Council of Europe level C1/C2); non-native speakers need to furnish evidence of their English language skills. For details on accepted certificates, please check our website at www.da-vienna.ac.at/MAIS.

Admission to the MAIS programme is by means of a competitive selection. Complete application files are reviewed by the MAIS Programme Committee. Candidates may also be required to sit a written exam and/or be available for an interview.



DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

Over the two years of the MAIS programme, a minimum of 120 ECTS points must be earned including min. 102 ECTS points for core and advanced courses in the four main disciplines.

Individual research is part of the requirements: besides completing at least three seminars, MAIS students have to research and write a final master thesis.

Successful completion of language training courses (min. 4 ECTS points) is necessary in order to graduate.

Elective courses in the modules for 'Area Studies' and 'Austrian Studies' complete the curriculum.

EXCHANGE PROGRAMMES

An open mindset, keen interest in and respect for diversity as well as flexibility are key tools for both academic achievement and future career success, which the DA actively fosters in its students. Exchange programmes provide an excellent opportunity for acquistion and training of these abilities.






Therefore, the DA has concluded cooperation agreements with a select number of renowned international institutions, in order to develop exchange programmes which would benefit the students in their academic quality as well as by their geographical importance.

Second-year students are eligible for admission to four-month exchange programmes between the DA and the following partner universities:



- MGIMO (Master Programmes in International Affairs and Political Science)
- Korea University's Graduate School of International Studies (MA Programmes in International Studies)
- I the China Foreign Affairs University (CFAU)
- I the Hebrew University of Jerusalem (European Forum's Study Programmes)



All institutions involved offer study programmes which share an interdisciplinary approach, have a similar curriculum in the 4 core disciplines (law, economics, politics, history), and are entirely taught in English. As a result, exchange students enjoy their term abroad while completing coursework within highly compatible study programmes, thereby easing the transfer of credits earned abroad to the home institution.



MAIS students apply for participation in exchange programmes during their first year (by the end of January) and are selected on the basis of their academic performance. Outgoing exchange students spend their term abroad at the beginning of their second MAIS year.

The DA regularly applies for Erasmus+ funding student mobility. Erasmus+ funding includes a lump-sum "travel grant" and the "individual support grant" (monthly allowance calculated on the basis of the exchange duration). Students selected for the programme are informed about the availability of Erasmus+ funds for the exchange upon admission (usually by the end of May).

COOPERATIVE DEGREE PROGRAMMES

The DA has long-established cooperative degree programmes with the Johns Hopkins University's School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS Europe) and the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University.

Within the framework of bilateral cooperation agreements, after successful completion of one year of study students may spend their second year at any of the partner institutions. Each institution will accept for degree credit the equivalent of one academic year of coursework from the other institution.

Applicants must fulfil the application requirements of the receiving institution: The deadline for applications is January 7 (SAIS) / January 10 (Tufts) / January 15 (MAIS) of each year.

Designated staff at the DA will advise and support MAIS students in planning their application for the second year at SAIS Europe. During the first year at the DA information meetings are taking place in due time for MAIS students interested in applying for any of the two joint degree programmes.

Each institution will maintain control of admissions to its programmes. Successful candidates must meet admission standards of the hosting institution.

All second year fees, including tuition, will be due to the institution in which the student is enrolled for the second year. Candidates will be considered for financial aid by the receiving institution.

Upon successful completion of the cooperative degree programme, students will be awarded:

- the MAIS degree, if the second year is completed at the DA, after having attended the first year at SAIS Europe
- I the MAIA degree, if the second year is completed at SAIS Europe, after having attended the first year at the DA
- I the MAIS degree or the MALD degree depending on the student's choice between fulfilling the MAIS degree requirements (e.g. the master thesis) or the MALD degree requirements (e.g. capstone project) irrespective of the institution where the second year is completed.



HUJ exchange

'We had the chance to spend one semester at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. The unique status of Jerusalem as an Israeli and Palestinian city made us familiar not only with the Palestinian-Israeli conflict, but furthermore with the sentiments and cultures of both states. The two-year ETIA programme is a professional master's degree programme (Universitätslehrgang*) that offers the opportunity to study environmental issues in their political, legal and technical dimensions. This interdisciplinary programme is organised in cooperation with the TU Wien's Continuing Education Center.

ETIA prepares graduates for high-flying careers as managers and consultants, as well as for political and diplomatic tasks in the fields of environment and sustainable development, where they can rationally assess environmental requirements with clarity and actively take part in the shaping of new norms.

Professional master's programmes like the MSc ETIA focus on professional career development rather than a career in academia.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

In each year, a minimum of 60 ECTS points has to be earned (120 ECTS points for the whole programme).

During the first year at the DA (min. 60 ECTS credits) students must complete:

- min. 47 ECTS credits for mandatory (core) and elective (advanced) courses in the four main disciplines (see programme structure above)
- 1 seminar
- 5 ECTS credits for the Master Thesis Module

During the second year at the TU Wien (min. 60 ECTS credits) student must complete:

- I min. 45 ECTS credits for courses in the four main modules (see programme structure above)
- 15 ECTS credits for their master thesis.

'Interdisciplinary International Studies' (IIS) is a four-year doctoral programme organised by the Vienna School of International Studies (DA) and the University of Vienna.



The interdisciplinarity of this high-quality doctoral programme makes for an innovative model. The programme is designed to enable graduates to be competitive in the international academic job market. It is also designed as a small programme, in which students interact frequently with their advisors and are embedded in the vibrant academic life of the DA, through research assistantships and direct involvement in teaching activities.

TARGET GROUP

The programme is open to graduates (Master's degree) who wish to pursue a research project linking at least two of the four disciplines of legal studies, political science, international economics and history.

COURSE CONTENT & STRUCTURE

The programme involves demanding coursework prior to writing a doctoral thesis, during the prep-year. Students select two disciplines, in which they sit comprehensive exams, and which feature in their doctoral theses. The disciplines to choose from are:

- Political Science/International Relations
- Law
- History
- Economics.

Exceptions are possible if the research project a student pursues requires input from another discipline – most notably area studies.

Students have two dissertation supervisors from different disciplines, one from the DA and one from the University of Vienna. The specific curriculum for the prep-year is defined in agreement with the supervisors and on the basis of the specific research project.

ADMISSION

Eligible for admission to the IIS doctoral programme are candidates who fulfil the following requirements:

- hold a second-level university degree (Master's degree or equivalent, 300 ECTS credits) in disciplines related to the proposed research project
- have acquired proficiency in English (Council of Europe level C1/C2); non-native speakers need to furnish evidence of their English language skills. For details on accepted certificates, please check our website at www.da-vienna.ac.at/PhD.

Relevant professional experience is an advantage.

Admission to the IIS doctoral programme is by means of a competitive selection.

A completed online application form together with all the required documents must be sent to the Vienna School of International Studies (DA) (see below for application deadlines).

Complete applications are reviewed by the IIS Programme Committee. Candidates may also be required to be available for an interview.



Tina Welke Koordinatorin für Deutsch als Fremdsprache The study of languages has not only enjoyed a long tradition at the DA, but is also an obligatory component of the curricula of the individual study programmes. Emphasis is placed on English, French and German, the working languages of the Academy. Study of all three languages is compulsory for non-native speakers in the Diploma Programme, whilst in MAIS and ETIA a certain number of credits must be obtained in a language module (in French and/or German) during the course of the period of study. Further languages are offered in cooperation with the Language Centre of the University of Vienna and the Confucius Institute at the University of Vienna. Language courses lead to internationally recognised certificates, such as Cambridge, DELF/DALF/DFP RI or ÖSD. The language trainers are all highly qualified with many years of experience in their specialised fields.

Language training at the DA, however, goes well beyond the general acquisition of the grammar rules and vocabulary of a foreign language. It is conducted within the framework of the DA's strong and ongoing commitment to multilingualism and interculturalism, and includes from the very beginning the specialised training in formal and informal communication in a professional context necessary for a successful international career: politeness, presenting your point of view, telephoning and emails, writing CVs, the language of meetings and negotiations, small talk etc..


Among the highlights of studying at the DA are the various study trips, which enrich the curriculum and make for a unique educational experience.

STUDY TRIPS TO SOUTHEAST EUROPE

The historical regional focus of DA curricula on the Balkans is at the basis of this study-trip which offers a wonderful opportunity to learn about these regions and experience them first-hand from a very special DA perspective. CAREER COUNSELLING

Throughout the academic year, both DA staff and professors offer students individual counselling and support to:

- analyse their own ideas and interests in order to facilitate their search for a suitable job in a goal-oriented way
- I research job descriptions, possible employers and successful alumni careers
- I put together unique and persuasive application papers;
- develop a personal strategy for acquiring further experiences and improving their individual skills
- implement these strategies by applying for internships and jobs, and – with the help of the career services team – analyse the results.

CAREER DAY

Since 2013, at the initiative of the DA's alumni association, Club-DA, CEOs, department heads and high-ranking HR managers from highly renowned international organisations, NGOs and the private sector have been invited to an annual da.link career day.

During the course of this 'professional speed dating' the representatives sit down and talk with DA students about their career plans. A wide range of advice is given, experience is shared, and jobs, internship positions and follow-up meetings are offered.

CAREER SKILLS

To help students prepare individually for job interviews, the DA offers skills training in communication, presentation and negotiation techniques, simulations of job interviews and assessment centres, and how to prepare CVs in English, French and German. The quality of DA students' applications in comparison to others frequently makes the decisive difference. In addition, practice-oriented seminars and workshops on project, event and crisis management, public diplomacy, (journalistic) writing, protocol, etc. help students to develop additional professional and personal competences that are essential for a successful career.

CAREER TALKS AND LUNCHES



Formal and informal meetings with DA alumni working for international organisations located in Vienna (UN, OSCE, IAEA, CTBTO etc.) and abroad, for EU institutions or for international enterprises, banks or consultancy firms are an integral part of da.link.

Current employment opportunities, information on entrance examinations and internship announcements regarding international organisations, the EU, the private sector, etc. are regularly posted on the DA's new networking platform 'DA Wien Connect' as well as on the da.link career portal.

In addition, students have access to the global network of ClubDA. Through this, new graduates may obtain valuable advice from professionally successful alumni on application and career development strategies tailored to their respective fields of work.

ClubDA - OUR ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

The primary function of the DA's Alumni Association, ClubDA, is to foster and maintain contacts between former students and the Academy. These programmes enable students in financial need to pursue and complete their studies at the DA like so many alumni successfully did before.'



Research output and ongoing research projects continue to grow. What follows is a brief overview of selected research activities by resident faculty and postdoctoral fellows over the last years, together with a brief glance into the future.



Martin Feldkircher's research is located in the field of empirical macroeconomics and covers the areas of monetary economics, forecasting and economic growth. Applying his previous work on econometric tools to quantify the effects of a policy change in one country on the rest of the world, he published numerous co-authored articles and papers, for instance the Journal of Policy Modeling, the CAMA Working Papers, the Journal of the Royal Statistical Society, the WU Working Paper Series, and the Journal of Banking & Finance. Taken together, these studies demonstrate that expansionary monetary policy in the euro area or the USA can lead to positive spillovers on foreign output through a surge in trade and a broad financial channel. His ongoing research focuses on other aspects of monetary policy. This encompasses the distributional effects of inflated asset prices on euro area households' wealth, central bank communication (for example with publics), and the empirical effects of interest rate forward guidance on the macroeconomy at home and abroad.

Markus Kornprobst published three books: his single authored Co-managing International Crises: Judgments and Justifications (Cambridge: Cambridge University Press, 2019), the co-edited volume Diplomacy and Borderlands: African Agency at the Intersections of Order (London: Routledge, 2020) with Katharina Coleman and Annette Seegers and the second edition of his co-authored Understanding International Diplomacy: Theory, Practice and Ethics (London: Routledge, 2018, 2nd edition) with Corneliu Bjola. A Mandarin translation is being prepared by Beijing University Press. Over the same time period, he has published a number of refereed articles in reputable journals. This includes a study on African agency in the nuclear arms control regime in Third World Quarterly, research on diplomatic communication and changing governance systems in the Journal of International Relations and Development, investigations into framing and mobilising nations to go to war in the European Journal of International Relations, and an examination of the causes of change in multiplex international orders with Martin Senn. He is currently working on five research projects: the relationship of diplomacy and peace, digital international relations, the evolving nuclear order, peaceful change, and deglobalisation. He is the principal investigator in the Austrian Research Association's Working Group on Peaceful Change. Together with T.V. Paul, he is preparing a special issue on deglobalisation for International Affairs.



'At the Vienna School of International Studies (DA), we pursue a fact and research-driven approach to teaching economics. This implies that lectures cover the discussion of current policy issues and relate them to cutting edge research in the field of the lecturers' specialisation. The research orientation at the DA ensures that students are encouraged to solve economic problems early on, and helps in the development of career-relevant specialist and personal skills.'

Martin Feldkircher Professor of International Economics, Vienna School of International Studies Exploring the role of the European Union as an international actor, Patrick Müller published no less than eight articles in renowned journals. He looked into the roles NGOs play in the making of EU foreign policy (Journal of European Public Policy 2019; Comparative European Politics 2018), researched the way in which the EU provides mediation support to other mediators (European Security 2020, EIF Working Paper 2018), including international and regional organisations, private foundations and NGOs, and studied migration governance (Journal of European Public Policy 2020) as well as peacebuilding (European Security 2019, Contemporary Security Policy 2018, International Negotiations 2018), contributing to the 'local turn' in the peacebuilding literature. His future research will explore how domestic developments in EU



member states – including the recent wave or right-wing populism – relate to changes in the EU's external environment impact on EU foreign policy. This line of research is conducted in the framework of a major European Research Project – the COST Action ENTER (CA 17119), which includes over 30 partners from leading universities in Europe and which Müller co-directs. In the framework of the COST project, he is currently co-editing a special issue for the *Journal of European Integration* that explores how internal and external challenges faced by EU member states contribute to de-Europeanisation dynamics. Simultaneously, he is developing a proposal for a new research project that explores the impact of right-wing populism in Central and Eastern Europe on the (de)Europeanisation of foreign policy.

Julien Navarro examines the mechanisms of accountability of elected representatives such as parliamentarians. Other projects focus on the behaviour of Members of the European Parliament, the politics of Brexit, and populism in France. Lately, he developed an interest in studying public ethics, in particular the regulations on transparency and conflicts of interest in parliamentary institutions. Navarro plays a prominent role in the H2020 project RECONNECT 'Reconciling Europe with its Citizens through Democracy and Rule of Law' in which he coordinates the work package 'Practices of Democracy'. Furthermore, he is the principal investigator of the project ConstiRep 'Constituency Service and Policy Representation in European Parliaments' (PHC 'Pessoa' with the Universidade Nova de Lisboa, Portugal, 2020-21) and a member of the project Polit-Econ 'Political Behaviours and Electoral Accountability' (funded by the French ANR, 2019-2021). His most recent publications have appeared in the European Political Science Review ('Voters reward hard-working MPs: Empirical evidence from the French legislative elections', with A. François, 11:4, 2019), Parliaments, Estates and Representation (« Il n'y a pas de question idiote? Les questions des députés européens à la Commission européenne et au Conseil depuis 1979 », 39:2, 2019), and the Swiss Political Science Review ('Voters' Knowledge of Their Representatives: The Direct and Conditioned Effects of Parliamentary Work', with A. François, 26:1, 2020).

The three postdoctoral fellows also contribute to the intellectual vibrancy at the Academy. Justine Bendel's research interests lie in the intersections between international and environmental law. She is particularly interested in how existing structures of international law, such as international courts and tribunals, can adapt to new challenges posed by environmental protection. In that line of work, she recently published an article in the Nordic Journal of International Law on how the particular procedural tool of provisional measures of protection can be used positively in environmental cases. She also wrote a blog post on the role of international courts in stopping and preventing deforestation at the global level. This will also become a co-authored article for a special issue on the Amazon Rainforest, to be published in early 2021 in RECIEL (Review of European, Comparative and International Environmental Law). Moreover, her forthcoming book (2021) under contract with E. Elgar and entitled Litigating International Environmental Disputes: Process and Procedure will tackle broader issues international courts and tribunals are facing in environmental disputes.



Barnaby Crowcroft is working on converting his doctorate thesis, entitled 'The end of the British empire of protectorates, 1945–1960', into a book manuscript. The study presents a new take on Britain's end of empire story through exploring some of the unique political, legal and constitutional challenges that arose from decolonisation in a 'protected' rather than a colonial empire, in places including Nigeria, Ghana, Malaysia, Egypt, and the Sudan. During the past year, he wrote additional chapters on Yemen and on a collection of smaller former-protected states such as Lesotho and Swaziland, the Maldives, Oman, and Brunei. Other research outputs last year include a chapter exploring British constitutional legacies in the early post-colonial history of Nigeria: 'The radical nationalist as constitutional head of state: Nigeria, 1960-66', in H. Kumarasingham (ed.), Viceregalism: The Crown as Head of State in Political Crises in the Postwar Commonwealth (Cambridge, 2020). He also contributes occasional reviews and articles for magazines including the *Times Literary Supplement* and the National Review.

Mădălina Dobrescu published a co-authored article (Dobrescu, M. and T. Schumacher (2020) *The Politics of Flexibility: Exploring the Contested Statehood – EU Actorness Nexus in Georgia, Geopolitics, 25:2, 407-427*), and two co-authored book chapters in edited volumes (Dobrescu, M., T. Schumacher and S. Stavridis (2017), 'Southern Europe – Portugal, Spain, Italy, Malta, Greece, Cyprus' in A. Hadfield, I. Manners and R.G.

Whitman (eds.), *The foreign policies of European Union member states*, London (Routledge); and Bouris, D. and M. Dobrescu (2018), 'The ENP and CSDP missions in the neighbourhood' in T. Schumacher, A. Marchetti and T. Demmelhuber (eds.), *The Routledge Handbook on the European Neighbourhood Policy*, London: Routledge). Her research interests currently revolve around the processes driving states' participation in peace operations. Among her ongoing research projects on the topic is an article which seeks to explain the participation of novice states in peace operations from a role-theoretical perspective. Over the next two years she aims to complete a series of articles on third-country participation in EU military and civilian missions, which are envisioned as the basis for a future monograph.


DIPLOMACY - AUSTRIAN JOURNAL OF INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

One form has been designed to meet the different grant requirements for financial assistance.

Financial assistance decisions are taken after the review procedure for admissions is complete: among positively assessed applications, requests for financial assistance are considered. Applicants will receive both results together within six weeks after the application deadline expires.

CHOOSE YOUR PROGRAMME CAREFULLY.

Take your time to prepare your application and submit a complete file: complete application files are processed faster. In some instances documents (e.g. English certificate, academic transcript of records sent directly by your university, letters of recommendation) cannot be submitted by you and/or at the same time with the main batch, which we understand. Kindly make sure every item states your name and date of birth.

The list of supporting application documents posted online is complete; submit additional documents only if you deem these to be essential. Multiple applications are possible: in this case, one set of supporting documents will suffice (two sets if one of the chosen programmes is ETIA – see next page). However, the motivation letter(s) should refer to each of the chosen programmes.

a) English certificate:

Following certificates are accepted:

- CPE
- CAE (grade: A)
- IELTS (academic module, overall band score = 7.0 and no less than 7.0 for writing skills)
- TOEFL (106 points in the Internet test; DA institutional code/DI code = 7730)

If your English test results are not yet available, please add to your application package a written note specifying the test taken and the test date. The English certificate requirement can be waived in the following cases:

- I native speakers
- applicants who have studied at least three years in an English- speaking country
- applicants whose major was English translation/ interpretation

b) Degree and academic transcript of records:

If your degree certificate is not yet available, please add to your application package a written note stating when the certificate will be awarded and/or your expected date of graduation

If your final transcript of records bears the award information (degree awarded and award date), then this documents substitutes the copy of your degree. If you haven't graduated yet, please make sure you submit an updated temporary transcript of records along with a note stating your expected graduation date. If you have completed multiple degrees, please submit all records.

ATTENTION: Applications without the respective academic records (temporary or final) cannot be considered for assessment.

c) Letters of Reference (LoRs):

Two (2) academic letters of reference are required to complete your application for our graduate programmes. Three (3) LoRs are required for the doctoral programme.
