

## **Reinhard Heinisch**

Reinhard Heinisch (PhD, Michigan State U.) is Professor of Austrian Politics in Comparative Perspective at the University of Salzburg, where he also heads the Department of Political Science and Sociology. From 1986 to 2009, he lived and worked in the USA, where he held a professorship at the University of Pittsburgh and headed the International Studies Program. His research focuses on comparative populism, democracy, and political parties. His publications appear in leading international journals such as Party Politics, Democratization, West European Politics, Representation, Comparative European Politics and others. Recent books include Understanding Populist Party Organization (Palgrave, 2016), Political Populism: A Handbook (Nomos, 2017), The People and the Nation: Populism and Ethno-Territorial Politics in Europe (Routledge, 2019). He is currently leading an extensive EU Horizon2020 project on populism research. Heinisch is an affiliate faculty at the University of Pittsburgh, USA, guest lecturer at Renmin University in Beijing since 2014 and former president of the Austrian Society for Political Science. From 2011 to 2018 he headed the working group Democracy of the Austrian Research Foundation. In this context, the edited volume Kritisches Handbuch der österreichischen Demokratie (Böhlau, 2020) is being published. Current research projects relate to citizens' fundamental attitudes to democracy, which are analyzed transnationally using new empirical methods. In addition to his academic work and active international lecturing, Reinhard Heinisch is also a guest commentator in numerous domestic and foreign media including the Washington Post, NPR, The Economist, BBC, ARD, ZDF and many others. Reinhard Heinisch has been awarded the M. Lupac Science Prize by the Austrian Parliament.
